- 3) If your award is pending, please submit the transcript of the modules you have already undertaken.
- 4) If your first language is not English, a copy of your English language qualification certificate.
- 5) The names of **2 academic referees**. Please note that it is your responsibility to contact these referees and arrange for the references to be sent to Research Admissions either separately or with your application (in sealed envelopes).

RESEARCH SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE SCHOOL OF ARCHITECTURE & THE BUILT ENVIRONMENT

The School of Architecture and the Built Environment is actively engaged in research and consultancy for a variety of world-wide, European and UK clients in the public and private sectors. Admissions Requirements

We intend to award up to three scholarships to the best home and/or overseas applicants. The duration of the scholarships is three years, and they consist of a stipend (£14,940 per annum tax free) and a waiver of tuition fees. Successful candidates may be asked to contribute to teaching programmes for up to six hours per week, or to undertake equivalent other duties in support of the work of the School. Full-time PhD students are expected to play a role in the life of the School. In particular they will be required to attend a doctoral research training programme and to take part in progress seminars.

The successful candidates will have an undergraduate degree, with an award of 2.1 or above, and a postgraduate degree in a relevant built environment discipline, or another subject relevant to the proposed research area, or be of postgraduate standing (someone who can demonstrate equivalent and relevant professional experience). For those whose first language is not English, an IELTS score of 7.0 in all elements or equivalent English language proficiency is required.

Research Areas and Supervision

PhD students work with supervisory teams normally made up of a Director of Studies and a second supervisor. The staff listed below will be available to act as Director of Studies in the following broad topic areas:
